PURPOSE: This course will discuss the basic doctrines of the Christian Faith, as well as, some variation on those beliefs. Throughout the course, the historically Brethren/Anabaptist position will be emphasized where it is distinguishable from other traditions.

OBJECTIVES: By the end of this unit, the student will:

- A. Be able to identify four areas of current theological debate, place them in an historical context and identify appropriate ways of addressing the issues.
- B. Be able to identify four major Christian theologians, place them in an historical context and identify the contributions they have made to an understanding of the church's faith.
- C. Be able to identify the major theological streams of his/her congregation and articulate how beliefs and faith are formed in the congregation.
- D. Be able to define the relationship between theology and practice and the relationship to a particular life issue.
- E. Be able to articulate a "theological confession of faith" that expresses the student's basic convictions regarding the Christian message.

CLASS OUTLINE:

1. OUR FIRST CLASS: (February 28, 2025)

In our first class, we will discuss what Theology is and the varying doctrines about God and Scripture. We will go over the assigned text reading and articles provided.

2. OUR SECOND CLASS - (March 14, 2025)

In our second class, we will discuss the doctrines of humanity, Sin, the person and work of Christ, and the Holy Spirit. We will go over the assigned text reading and articles provided.

3. OUR THIRD CLASS – (March 28, 2025)

In our third class, we will discuss doctrines of salvation, the church, and the last things (Eschatology). We will go over the assigned text reading and articles provided.

Response paper expectations:

Response paper 1:

Describe your understanding of God.

What are the words you use in your personal relationship with God?

How would you answer a non-believer's question: If God created the universe like you say, how can he care about me?

Response paper 2:

Describe your understanding of Jesus Christ.

How would you answer a non-believer's question: Is Jesus God?

(Extra points if you can clearly describe the trinity.)

Response paper 3:

Describe you understanding of Sin.

What does it mean to be saved?

How would you answer a non-believer's question: Is there really a hell where all unbelievers go?
